

When should I wear gloves?

The risks to staff in the workplace that require you wear gloves are:

- If contact with blood, bodily fluids, mucous membranes or non-intact skin is likely 1.
- If contact with chemical hazards is likelyz 2.
- 3. If caring for a patient under isolation precautions
